Abstracts must be between 150 and 200 words, and workshop presentations must be between 250 and 400 words. Full title of the paper, title, full names and surname, Institutional affiliation, Email address (if paper has multiple authors, please state name of corresponding author), Telephone (cell/mobile or office), Fax Number, Postal address and postal code.

PRESENTATION

Oral presentations will be 20-minute talks plus 10 minutes for questions/discussions. Workshops will be allocated 60 minutes and must have a minimum of two authors.
